
Our strategic direction

Update on IANR Budget

Permanent Reductions

(\$2.5M) 2017/18 (\$10.1M) 2021/22/23 (\$2.8M) 2024 (\$15.4M)

The university faces an estimated \$58 million shortfall by the end of the 2024-25 fiscal year

Short-term measures:

- A hiring freeze on all non-faculty positions.
- A temporary 4% across-the-board rescission on all departmental operating and supply budgets.

Long-term five-point vision:

- 1) A reinvigorated focus on student recruitment
- 2) A renewed commitment to raising the University of Nebraska's academic profile
- 3) A more proactive process for reviewing the university's range of academic programs
- 4) New strategies for communication and transparency around budget planning
- 5) A focus on operational excellence

Fischer says \$25M has been secured for ag research center at Innovation Campus

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Senator Deb Fischer (R-Neb.), a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, announced that she secured \$25,000,000 for the construction of a new Agricultural Research Service (ARS) facility at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL) in the Fiscal Year 2024 (FY24) Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act. Sen. Fischer also secured funding to support both the National Drought Mitigation Center (NDMC) at UNL and the National Ag Data Cooperative that is led by UNL.

The bill, which must still be voted upon by the Senate and House, was advanced today by the Senate Appropriations Committee by a bipartisan vote of 28-0 as a first key step.

"Nebraska is becoming a world-renowned leader in agricultural research. I'm proud to have pushed for these critical projects, which will cement our state's position as a hub for ag innovation and support family farmers and ranchers. I will continue to use my position on the Appropriations Committee to champion high-impact investments that empower producers and aid rural communities," said Sen. Fischer.

- \$1M to ARD and ARS for data solutions for climate smart and resilient agriculture (with continued funding through FY28)

Government shutdown

Government shutdown averted after Senate passes bill with just hours to spare

Just hours before a potential government shutdown, Republicans and Democrats in the Senate passed <u>a roughly 45-day continuing resolution</u> with disaster relief funds, an extension of a federal flood insurance program and FAA reauthorization — but <u>no Ukraine aid</u>. Saturday's passage in the Senate ended a weeks-long House debate over government funding that Friday night appeared to be headed toward a shutdown. The Senate eventually ditched its own stopgap bill to pass a House version that was introduced Saturday morning.
